# President's Letter

Dear MKR Society Friends -

I would like to thank everyone for welcoming me into my new role as society president at the last conference. The Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Society is exemplary in its collegiality and diversity of membership. It is an honor to serve in this new role.

For my inaugural letter, I would like to stress the importance of societies like this one to our preservation of historical figures and continued support of literary works that are becoming lost in the noise of the digital age. Before I joined this society, I was a member of the Ellen Glasgow Society and watched as membership declined, along with the journal's publication until neither existed. I was crestfallen.

A while ago, I learned from Steve Brahlek and others of the Elizabeth Madox Roberts Society in Kentucky and was able to meet with its president at the South Atlantic Modern Language Society. Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings was familiar with Roberts and even had her first novel South Moon Under compared with The Time of Man by Roberts in reviews. Her only published work about Roberts was a bit overly critical, as she found Roberts's prose style to be overly poeticized and felt she used dialect too extensively in her novels. Both writers were considered to be regionalists by many critics and that classification may be why each writer, and Glasgow for a time, has maintained such ardent support from the regional communities in their home states.

This year, our own Ginny Phillips was able to attend the Roberts Society Conference on behalf of our MKR Society and was impressed by our mutual love of conservationism, music, and historic regional attractions. If you are receiving this newsletter and have not attended our conference, please consider doing so. This year, we toured the Frank Lloyd Wright buildings on Florida Southern's campus. In years' past, we've gone on river tours and scrub walks. The panelists range from ferryboat culture to cast iron cooking and even included a nationally renowned architect, Richard Bergmann, who has restored the original Max Perkins homestead in Connecticut and listed Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings as one of his protégées on the home's plaque. A few lucky attendees walked away from the silent auction with cuttings of the inaugural Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings rose that was debuted at the conference.

What makes our society so important is that in celebrating Rawlings, we also celebrate all that she held dear, as do similar regional societies. In supporting this society, we keep alive a legacy worth sustaining.







