## President's Letter

MKR Society Trustee Emeritus David Nolan recently sent me a link to an article in America, the National Catholic Weekly newsmagazine.2 Entitled: "Writing Home: Literary pilgrimages to the homes of Catholic authors," the article described the reaction of visitors when visiting the homes of Flannery O'Connor, Thomas Merton, Margaret Mitchell, and Graham Greene. Kerry Weber, who penned the story, related an account of a visitor to O'Connor's home in Milledgeville, Georgia. The burly man wept openly as he signed the guestbook. "This is embarrassing," he confessed, "but it's so meaningful." This story reminded me of the experience of many people when they visit Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings's farm and home in Cross Creek. The author's words, beloved by many, literally come alive in front of the visitor. It is often said that Rawlings's descriptions of the Florida landscape make you feel like you are "right there." But, actually standing under a magnolia

tree in her yard transforms the "Magnolia Tree" passage from Cross Creek into a homily about the wonders and beauty of the magnolia grandiflora and the solace and joy that the author took from "its broad leaves, shining like dark polished jade." An ordinary, even ubiquitous tree is thus transformed into a sacred thing. Rawlings brings about this transformation over and over in her work. Members of the interpretative staff at the Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Historic State Park frequently witness the power of the personal encounter with Rawlings that a visit to her home provides for visitors.

As the curator of her papers at the University of Florida, I am charged with providing access to the fruits of her creative energies, i.e. her manuscripts and correspondence. I have found that a similar kind of personal encounter with Rawlings can take place in the archive. Being able to handle her papers in their original form creates [see page 3]
