Earlier this year, Anne Pierce, our vice president, received a letter from a longtime member of the society and former Palatka resident reminiscing about his time in Florida. When Robert J. Cook moved to Palatka in 1985, Norton Baskin was still living on Anastasia Island and Cook visited the Rawlings home and read books by Rawlings and Idella Parker. Her work left an indelible impression on him. Here is a section of the letter he shared.

> My late friend, Tom Capell, was a native of Hawthorne. He told me that when he was in high school in the 1930s, he delivered ice during the summer. Ms. Rawlings was one of his regular customers. In those days, the ice man would take the ice into the house and put it in the icebox. On one occasion, he said he went into her home to deliver ice and discovered a raccoon inside her ice box. When he told her, she said not to disturb it, that it would not eat too much.

Cook currently resides in Waterloo, Illinois, and feels privileged to be part of the Rawlings Society. He wrote that his heart still remains in Florida. Preserving memories, like the ones shared in this letter, is the reason so many of us dedicate our time and resources to the Rawlings Society. Can't you just see Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings thinking up Racket, the raccoon pet of Fodder-wing in *The Yearling*, asking the ice man to leave her household intruder alone? The story reminds us of the writer we have come to know and love and the place she represented so well, a place many of us call home, Florida.

Here's wishing you lots of ice for the hot Florida days to come and no raccoons in the house.

### The 29<sup>th</sup> Annual MKR Conference The Florida Yacht Club, Jacksonville, FL April 1-2, 2016

Robert Bowman from Florida State University presented on poverty in "Jacob's Ladder." Christopher Nank from Ringling College of Art and Design presented on the "Imagery of Invasion and Occupation in 'Jacob's Ladder." Jon Bosworth and Mark Kirwan of Flagler College described their experiences working through Stetson Kennedy's papers, and we heard from Sandra Parks, Kennedy's widow, on the current state of Kennedy's *Palmetto Country*.
