Rawlings gave the Cracker families something unique. When their resources were inadequate, she pulled them through the tight places. She gave to them when they had nothing tangible to give in return though they did the best they could. If she needed fresh venison for her table, they provided it. . .

The greatest gift of the Cross Creek community to Rawlings, however, was intangible. It was the spirit of their acceptance of their circumstances in place and time. It was the story of a people whose daily life was a twin struggle, spent in fighting back the dense sub-tropical vegetation that threatened to capture their small oneroom, tar-paper shacks where they held at bay from the only door into the home the intangible attacks from the impersonal presence known as starvation. . . .

It was the legacy of a people who had become too familiar with hopelessness and despair, but who continued to forge ahead in life with no thought of giving up. . . It was the joy of a people whose spirit rose above thin, ragged bodies and stomachs too often empty. It was the voice of a people giving song to a past worth remembering and a hope in a future worth anticipating. (published in *The MKR Journal of Florida Literature* 15)
